Agritourism as a Tool for Connection

Our modern world moves faster and gets more complex each day. We spend more time connected to a device than we do connecting with each other and our surroundings. The symptoms of our increasingly artificial reality have lead folks to pursue reconnecting with nature and the environment. Of the many ways people are choosing to get re-grounded, one of the most popular is through building a stronger understanding of where our food comes from. Great options for re-engagement include supporting your local food vendors at a farmers market or subscribing to a weekly community supported agriculture food delivery. You can also go straight to the source and pick it yourself!

well as provides the space and time to educate people about the work that goes into turning a seed in the soil into a tasty treat in their basket. There is also the benefit to the grower of reduced labor, marketing and transport costs when their customers are already in the field. U-Picks can be a great way to fortify lean seasons by increasing direct sales via U-Pick during the growing periods of popular fruits like strawberries, apples and various stone fruits.

Agritourism helps place farmers and their farms front and center for the common consumer who might not think twice about where and how their food is being grown. It also adds a layer of compassion and understanding for the workforce that harvests our food daily. Harvesting your own produce makes food personal and relatable, which are essential as we work towards rebuilding the cultural value of agriculture.

to offer irrigation evaluations at your commercial operation starting this Fall. In addition, we can reimburse the cost of a pump efficiency test for producers who cultivate 50 acres or less, or those who belong to an underserved ethnic group. These evaluations will be performed by our new irrigation technician, Andy Williamson!

Originally from the UK, Andy arrived in California in 2018 and joined the RCD a few months later to coordinate our community garden program and also serve as an assistant to the Healthy Soils demonstration project at the Tijuana River Valley Community Garden. Although his academic background is in Economics, he has a longtime passion for sustainable agriculture and is an alumni of the Multinational Exchange for Sustainable Agriculture program in Applied Agroecology. Now a small-scale farmer himself, he understands deeply the economic and environmental necessity of using our natural resources more efficiently and particularly water in these times of drought. Andy comes to the team with great personal investment in helping other farmers improve their irrigation efficiency so that agriculture in San Diego can continue productively long into the future.

Funding Opportunities

Disaster and Extreme Weather Assistance Programs

Drought, Fire, COVID-19 - if your business has been struck by disaster this year, non-profits and agencies are offering funds to help. Deadlines are coming up! If you are a small-scale producer in San Diego or part of a socially disadvantaged group, we are here to help you complete your application. TO help you navigate the application process, set up an appointment at the RCD with Joel Kramer (joel.kramer@rcdsandiego.org, 619-562-0096 x103).

Community Alliance with Family Farmers Family Farmer Emergency Fund is currently open to farmers who suffered losses in crops, sales or additional expenses due to the 2021-2022 drought. Applications deadline extended to August 15. [Find the online application here.](#)

County of San Diego is offering support to businesses impacted by COVID-19. [You can learn how to apply here.](#) Awards average \$5,000 and the grant can be used to reimburse previous expenses, or for new expenditures within 60 days of the grant award.

US Department of Agriculture offers a variety of programs to help farmers, ranchers, communities, and businesses that have been hard hit by natural disaster events, like drought, fire and flooding. [See here for more info.](#)





Get funding for carbon farming practices through **Zero Food Print's Restore CA** private grant. They have just re-opened their applications for a short time only, from June 7th through August 8th, and are awarding \$200,000 total with a max individual grant request of \$25,000. If you applied for the Healthy Soils Program, you may have everything you need for this quick and easy application. [Check here for more info!](#)

Zero Food Print's Compost Connector is designed to get the maximum greenhouse gas reduction from organic material--not sending it to the landfill is good, but turning organics into compost and applying it onto working lands is great. Everyone is eligible, though farms willing to take larger amounts of compost will likely be prioritized. Projects can be submitted at any time, and will be fulfilled on a rolling basis. Seeds for Bees is a program funded by Project Apism, to provide farmers and ranchers with subsidized cover crop seed mixes that support honeybees. Enrollment is open until August 31st, but supplies go fast so [check out more info here today!](#)

Organic Farmers and Farmers in Transition can receive support from the USDA to help cover costs of organic certification and additional expenses in the process. Applications are due October 31st. [See more information here.](#)

Do you want to get serious about conservation practices on your working land? The National Resource Conservation Service offers financial and technical support to agricultural producers and non-industrial forest managers through the **Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)**.
